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Welcome

Dear Headteacher and Music Lead,

It's been over twelve months since we launched *The Music Partnership* as the new identity for Department for Education funded music education work delivered across Staffordshire, Stoke-on-Trent and Telford & Wrekin and what a year it's been! 2020 started with aspirations for a 'Big Month of Music' in March which was set to be one of the biggest national celebrations of music-making in schools to date. How lucky we were that much of this programme was planned to be delivered digitally and was a great success at the end of March.

Echoing the sentiments of our Board chair who has kindly written below, I know all our partners would like to thank schools for all their efforts to find ways to work with us and their families to keep music education alive through lockdown. We've engaged with thousands of families through this time and know from surveys and individual conversations that a weekly music lesson has often been a key highlight for pupils and, in some cases, their parents too. None of this would have been possible without the dedicated work of our schools who have passed on key information on our behalf and given support and backing to our adapted ways of working.

In previous editions of this newsletter, I have spoken about the impending review and publication of a revised National Plan for Music Education which is to take us all forward to 2030. Covid-19 has somewhat delayed this process but we know from continuing dialogue with the DfE that music education remains a strong priority for them, schools and our communities and I will update further once details and timescales emerge.

In the interim, *The Music Partnership* remains committed to ensuring all young people can sing, learn an instrument and perform as part of an ensemble or choir. This is a challenging aspiration even in more 'normal' times, given the vast pupil population across our region and our reliance on the continued additional financial contributions made by our parents, schools and charitable funders.

To realise these ambitions, particularly in these uncertain times, our partners are committed to "doing the things that others can't do" when it comes to music education and I wanted to highlight some of the key characteristics which make this partnership, and the organisations within it, truly special:

- Inclusive practice as a key thread throughout our thinking, language, training, CPD, delivery and reporting.
- Practitioners who are experts in their field, well-trained and highly adaptive to school and family needs.
- Experienced across a range of settings, including digital and with different styles, genres and sizes of pupil groupings.
- Knowing that 'Youth Voice' and 'Child Centred Delivery' are key in all planning, delivery and assessment.
- Ensuring musical progression is always a key priority and measure of quality.
- Enabling targeted support (e.g. funding for individuals or activities) that reaches those most in need.
- Knowing that in times of crisis, bespoke solutions must be offered alongside flexibility.

At times through the spring and summer, is has sometimes felt that music education has never been more at risk. However, despite some initial messaging around "catch up curriculum" or "reduced breadth in the short term", it is encouraging that the previous focus on a broad and balanced curriculum offer has remained in place and many schools across our region have continued to make music a priority. There will certainly be continued 'lumps and bumps' to the whole picture of school delivery through 2020-21 but we're delighted that schools are continuing to find innovative ways to enable activity rather than to curtail it. Whether it is with continued advocacy to the DfE, targeting specific funding and support, facilitating CPD or providing teaching, the organisations within *The Music Partnership* are here to work locally with schools, families, communities and young people so please stay in contact through the year as we all continue to adapt.

Within this newsletter you will find details of how our partners have been, and are, adapting provision for the year ahead alongside key case studies, news articles and celebrations from earlier in 2020. I hope you find this useful in identifying what is possible for the year ahead and please do contact us for further information or to help with planning your offer.

Survey Results in Staffordshire

In June, the Music Service launched a parental survey to assess the impact of digital music delivery from March to mid-June 2020 and ask key questions about the summer and autumn terms.

We were delighted to receive almost 600 responses and the results are very interesting:

- Total Responses: 574
- 90% of families felt digital music lessons were a good or excellent experience
- 88% stated that music lessons were 'essential' or 'important' for the year ahead
- Overwhelmingly, returning to face to face teaching asap was a key request
- Parents not having the details of **how lessons would re-start** was a key challenge
- There was very little concern about the **safety of face to face lessons** in school
- Summer digital provision was requested and has been provided
- Many families did not know specifically what the term 'ensemble' meant

Beyond changing our language to make it more accessible ("music groups" rather than "ensembles" for example) it is encouraging to see that digital provision has been valued as an interim solution for many families. It is a useful addition to the response to Covid-19 but clearly does not replace the value our families place on face to face learning.

Our partners and services are music education experts and are best placed to work with schools and families on re-starting face to face provision safely. Please contact your local music service to discuss planning and risk assessments.

#CanDoMusic is a solutions-based campaign to help schools and music providers overcome the challenges of Covid-19. 

Unstoppable



Secondary Curriculum Matters

Being prepared for the 'new normal'

With regular guidance emerging from Central Government and Music Associations, we all need to keep up-to-date with what is being recommended as we move into the new world of Covid-19 safe teaching and learning. Much of the guidance is advisory and so schools need to make their own decisions about how to manage the situation, so there can be no "one size fits all" formula for moving forward.

However, whatever difficulties we face, we must maintain our enthusiasm and passion for music and its value. Despite hints and leaks in June of the possibility that music may be dropped in favour of core subjects, this was not the case when the government guidance was published on 2nd July.

We were heartened to read that there is an expectation for a broad range of subjects to be taught from years 7 to 9 and that the arts are included in that list. What we are being asked to do is to prioritise the most important components within the subject for progression. In this respect, we may need to decide between quality and breadth of coverage, recognising also that some activities will just not be possible for the foreseeable future.

We need to go through our curriculum maps highlighting the essential components which will enable our pupils to move forward in their musical understanding and skills, then planning and delivering activities which support this.

More than ever, the value of music in terms of social and emotional development needs to be capitalised upon. Music can play a key role in helping children and young people to recover from the consequences of the pandemic and emotional impact of wider societal changes.

Through careful planning and delivery of safe activities, music can help children to

- rebuild their social interactions and teamwork skills
- express their feelings and control their emotions
- divert attention from concerns
- reinstate motivation to engage in activity together
- regain a sense of routine

Keeping in contact with each other

In the new teaching situation, there is good reason to keep in contact with each other to share ideas and successes and to explore new ways of working.

In June and July, *The Music Partnership* ran two sets of network meetings for secondary teachers and these were exceptionally well attended. The benefits of online networking which avoids the need to travel to a venue were so great that we had to ask ourselves the question "Why didn't we think of this before?". The July meetings offered the opportunity for leaders of the three music services to share plans for the new academic year with teachers in their authority as well as engaging staff in a general discussion about the challenges of teaching music to whole classes.

One topic which was touched upon was how we acknowledge online learning which has taken place during lockdown. It was clear that there are two schools of thought on this. One is that the work pupils may have done during lockdown needs to be positively recognised and built on. The other is that those who were unable to undertake tasks because of lack of facilities to do so at home must not feel further disadvantaged.

Some colleagues said that they had been told not to overtly acknowledge work done during the summer term and others were encouraging teachers to assess it. The important thing must be that for those who have gained new knowledge and skills, opportunity exists for them to build upon on them and not repeat ground they have already covered. Our planning must therefore embrace both groups.

In the autumn term we hope to run meetings for secondary teachers led by experts from the examination groups as well as having meetings to share experiences of the "new normal" in the classroom. We continue to provide an opportunity for the sharing of ideas on The Music Partnership Secondary Teachers' Facebook page. https://www.facebook.com/groups/2162547484074115/.

Signposts to new guidance as and when it emerges, will also be posted here. Other discussion forums can also be found and followed on Facebook and other social media platforms. One that is particularly busy with ideas for Key Stage 3 is called "Key Stage 3 Music – Hints and Tips", which also has a section dedicated to new official announcements. This too will be worth keeping an eye on as we move into the autumn term.

The Inspector Calls...

At the beginning of July, Ofsted announced their plans moving forward into the next academic year. In **September** inspectors will be piloting visits to find out how schools and colleges are managing the return to full time education with a small sample of volunteer schools. These visits, which will be ungraded, will be rolled out to a sample of all schools between **October** and **December**.

Provisionally, Ofsted plans to return to the full inspection cycle in **January**. The only full inspections that will take place in the autumn term will be of schools where serious safeguarding concerns have been raised.



GCSE and A-Level Examinations

New adjusted requirements for GCSE and A-Level examinations were published in early August. By the time this newsletter is published it is hoped that examination groups will have announced how these are to be implemented in the context of their own specifications.

The quantity of coursework required has been substantially reduced and the ensemble requirement relaxed which is helpful in the light of current restrictions. Across all subjects there are no plans to allow reduction in the content of the specifications, and whilst in some subjects there are modifications of the amount of content to be assessed in examination papers, there is no reference to such modifications in music. The consultation outcome document is available on the <u>government website</u>.

MUSIC SHARE

MusicShare is a singing outreach project involving Lichfield Cathedral Choristers/Young Singing Leaders supported by a partnership between Lichfield Cathedral School and Lichfield Cathedral and substantially funded by Arts Council England via The Music Partnership.

The well-worn sentence springs to mind – what strange times we are all living in! Like many of us, having to reform a finely-tuned machine without any of the usual resources whilst working from home and home-schooling, has made life challenging. Perhaps the biggest and yet most rewarding challenge of this period has been upskilling technologically. If, like me, you were pretty good at word-processing and basic Microsoft programmes but little more, it has been a massively steep learning curve!

So, how has MusicShare functioned in this uncertain time?

- Mini Voices (0-5 year olds and their carers)
- Young Voices (6-12 year olds)
- Youth Voices (13-18 year olds)
- Ladies who Lark (18+)

We decided, for various reasons, that we would go down the route of sending out rehearsal videos to our groups. We did not even consider running live lessons due to the fact that our groups came from a huge variety of settings – it made more sense to send out a video weekly at our normal rehearsal times. That meant people could 'tune in' when they were best able to do so around their 'new normal' lives. This has meant a huge amount of time spent learning to master Adobe Premiere Pro as a video editing tool – but this has opened endless exciting possibilities such as being able to demonstrate rounds and harmony parts with simply oneself, due to the ability to multi-track aurally and visually.

In addition to some 40+ videos that were sent to our groups during the Summer Term, we have also taken advantage of the opportunity to send a weekly training video to our **MusicShare** Young Singing Leaders. This is a mixture of current choristers, former choristers, and musical students at Lichfield Cathedral School who make up a team of youngsters who help me deliver the project out in schools. The raison d'être of these leaders has always been to show that if you dedicate time and effort to master a particular subject then you can achieve extraordinary things – the marvellous thing is that our Young Singing Leaders gain so much themselves, because they learn so many transferable skills, not just musical ones.

In our work with the *The Music Partnership*, we have produced a plan that is possible and useful in a virtual world for schools. To date, we have produced 8 Hub Singing Assemblies, all of which are available on Entrust and City Music Service YouTube channels

or Telford & Wrekin Music's Facebook Page. In the first of these Hub Singing Assemblies we have also included a song called 'The New Normal' which I wrote in a rare moment of inspiration. We have also produced the first in a new series of newsletters from MusicShare, which point you in the direction of the latest science and guidelines on singing plus lots of ideas for repertoire and resources.

Within this first newsletter you will find a link to the resources for 'The New Normal' so do go and click this link to read – and on-going there will be a newsletter from *MusicShare* every half-term.

Moving forward we will be producing some exciting online projects for Early Years, Primary and Secondary plus some teacher training resources that will link to the Hub curriculum documents so please do watch this space (contacts for this are also on the newsletter). One of the things I am most excited to launch is a song sharing platform for teachers, which will be on Zoom monthly. I am always being asked for resources so this is your chance to pick my brain and to share your own favourite songs! The idea is we will sing through lots of repertoire as I find this is by far the best way of determining whether something will work for you and your students – so often songs do not easily lift off the page of a book!

These will happen on the first Friday of every month from September onwards. Do book for your Zoom link via **musicshare@lichfieldcathedralschool.com**. More information for these sessions is also in our newsletter.

I firmly believe that music, singing and the arts are even more crucial than ever in seeing our way out of the fog of this crisis – so let's find positive ways to move forward together!

Transition

from Val Lewis, Head of Music, Walton High School, Stafford



There is undoubtedly something that happens between the summer term production in Y6 and the first term in Y7 where so many young people begin to think that music is no longer important.

I have no doubt that many Y7 students feel that they can hide their musical talents behind the anonymity of starting a new school, and the challenge of admitting their musicality is just too much. Perhaps it is the excitement of so many different activities on offer that means music takes a back seat. This year, with all the uncertainties surrounding Covid-19, and the questions being posed about the "risks" of musical activities and "social distancing", not just in school but in the wider world too, the challenge will no doubt be even greater. With the normal transition activities cancelled this year, we all had to find different ways of reaching out to our feeder primaries with questionnaires, musical quizzes or PowerPoint presentations advertising the activities that will (hopefully) be on offer in September. So, if things ever return to normal, we need to think about what we can we do, as secondary teachers and musicians, to encourage, cajole or persuade students to keep the rhythm going?

At Walton High School, we have developed activities over the years which we feel can help bridge the gap between primary and secondary school. Contact your music co-ordinators in the primary feeder schools: they may not be music specialists, and often welcome ideas and suggestions that a group chat can enable. See if you can build time into your teaching timetable to undertake regular visits to feeder primaries. In the past, I have done sets of lessons for Y6 pupils as a transition activity - Y5 may be an appropriate target too. Once you have your Pyramid group set up, begin to think about the kinds of activities that could work for you. For over 20 years, we have held an annual Pyramid Concert, involving singers from our feeder primaries and our school choir (about 160 singers in all!). The format is very simple - chose a theme (recently we have taken the National Sing Up Day song as our concert theme), select 4 or 5 songs that we can all sing together, and each school chooses a "spotlight song" to perform based on the concert theme. Be adventurous and include songs in parts (partner songs are great for this), even some



audience participation – getting the headteachers to demonstrate their percussion skills is always popular! A concert that lasts about an hour is perfect.

Primary schools are eager to welcome visits from older pupils. Take a group of GCSE students to perform their exam pieces particularly good if they are former students – and get them to talk about why they have continued with their music studies. It is excellent performance practice for your GCSE and A-Level or BTEC students too. This leads us neatly into instrumental transition. Whole class music tuition in primary schools sounded like a brilliant idea at first, but many of us have seen a drastic reduction in the numbers of pupils continuing their instrumental tuition beyond this, especially as tight budgets have forced many primary schools to look at how to deliver limited resources to as many students as possible. It is worth asking how schools follow up their whole class tuition. Some years ago, one of my peripatetic teachers came up with the idea of a "Clarinet Extravaganza". We sent invitations out to clarinettists of any ability to join us at the high school for a morning's rehearsal followed by a short concert at lunchtime.

This has grown from about 20 participants in the first year to well over 100 in this our 8th year. Ranging from complete beginners to grade 8 pupils, we now include flutes and saxophones, and again based around a simple theme, we play some pieces all together with parts of varying difficulty. This allows us to also showcase some of our more advanced students with solo and ensemble work. The emphasis is on the fun element of making music, and what you can achieve if you keep going. It is also a great way of introducing musicians to each other across the year groups and giving younger students a taste of what it is like to be in the big school. Last year, we piloted a similar idea with our "Brass Fiesta" and it should have been followed up with a "String Spectacular" had Covid-19 not interfered! There is so much scope for similar ideas with guitars, even samba bands, depending what you feel will work for you.

In Harmony Year 6 Creative Rap & Music Video

The children worked with grime artist C4. composer Jeremy Clay, producer Richard Shrewsbury and film-maker Jay Langdell over the course of a day to create their own raps and artwork to be used in a music video. The children filmed their performances and recorded their audio which was then sent through to the artistic team.

Despite the obvious challenges of the situation, the children worked really hard to achieve a fantastic result. The final product was turned into a music video which celebrated their time at school before they transition to secondary school in September.

III Furthering Talent



Despite the obvious challenges, it's a very exciting time for the Furthering Talent programme which is delivered between The Music Partnership and Awards for Young Musicians (AYM). Nationally, AYM will be welcoming five new Hub partners into the Furthering Talent family (Bournemouth/Christchurch and Poole, Lewisham, Liverpool, Sunderland and Worcestershire) and will soon be supporting over 500 children from across the country.

Whilst it isn't clear what format instrumental lessons will be taking for the new term, we are continuing to look for new and innovative ways to keep making music so that when things do get moving again, there will be plenty for young people to engage with. Firstly, we've agreed with Charanga that every child on **Furthering Talent** can have a free log in to their wonderful VIP Studio platform at www.vip.charanga.com.

VIP studio is an online recording studio which gives you everything you need to create, produce and release your own music. There is no need for any specialist equipment as it is all hosted on the site – just log in, watch a couple of tutorial videos and you can be making great music within just a few minutes. To really enhance this, we are planning to offer a live VIP workshop with some specialist producers via video calling as one of our future 'Get Together' events. This should be a really exciting experience and will be an opportunity to be creative in a totally new way for many young people. As soon as details are finalised, we will make sure that we share them.

Secondly, from September onwards we are launching our new mentor offer for all **Furthering Talent** students. Since 1998 AYM have supported over 3000 young musicians through our annual Awards programme.

Many of them have gone on to become professional musicians, others are continuing to study music at a higher level, whilst some are simply enjoying full musical lives.

We always try to keep in touch with previous Award winners and we think that their experiences and stories could be a valuable resource for the young people currently on the **Furthering Talent** programme. We've already developed a mentoring programme called Talent to Talent (<u>https://www.a-y-m.org.uk/a-look-back-attalent-to-talent/</u>) the second phase of which is in progress now, and we are taking this learning forward into **Furthering Talent** too. We've recruited some of our previous Awards winners, given them mentoring training (based on our Talent to Talent training) and will now be offering termly mentoring sessions for all **Furthering Talent** students.
